

# Monthly Police Report

## November 2022

### Auto Accidents:

11/01- A pedestrian was struck by a vehicle at the intersection of Gilcrest Road and Nassau Drive. Pedestrian was taken to hospital by ambulance. No tow required  
11/10- A two vehicle collision occurred at the intersection of Arleigh Road and East Shore Road. No injuries reported and no tow required.

### Aided Cases:

11/01- A pedestrian walking on Gilcrest Road was struck by a vehicle and transported to North Shore Hospital suffering injuries to the head and neck.  
11/06- A resident of Beverly Road was suffering from back pain. Aided was evaluated at scene but refused any further medical attention or transport.  
11/06- A resident of Beverly Road fell in the home. Aided was evaluated at scene but refused any further medical attention or transport.  
11/06- A resident of Beverly Road was transported to North Shore Hospital after suffering symptoms of stomach distress.  
11/09- A resident of Arleigh Road fell and hit their head. Aided was evaluated at scene but refused any further medical attention or transport.  
11/11- A patient of an East Shore Road doctor's office was transported to North Shore Hospital after suffering from kidney stones.  
11/13- A resident of Kensington Court was transported to North Shore Hospital after suffering from high blood pressure and covid symptoms.  
11/14- A resident of Arleigh Road fell in the home. Aided was evaluated at scene but refused any further medical attention or transport.  
11/23- A North Drive resident was checked on scene by paramedics for a possible seizure. Aided and family members at scene refused transport or further medical attention.

### Ambulance Calls:

### Vacant Homes:

The number of homes reported vacant during the month was 11. All were found to be secure.

### Miscellaneous:

- Police assisted guests and private security with traffic control during a large gathering for a memorial service.
- Kensington Police assisted KPPD and GNEPD after KPPD reported a vehicle failing to pull over and fleeing scene. Subjects fled into New York City jurisdiction and NYPD notified.
- Temporary No Parking signs were deployed throughout the village in order to alleviate possible traffic /parking conditions.
- Police responded to the front of 1 Kensington Gate for a wellness check for unknown male. Subject appeared in good health and refused any assistance while walking southbound on MNR.
- Police responded to Nassau Drive for a report of an occupied vehicle causing a noise disturbance. Upon arrival the vehicle was no longer at scene and a canvass produced negative results.
- The Kensington Police Department participated in a Directed Enforcement Initiative which was implemented to increase pedestrian safety throughout the village.
- A report was taken for possible identity theft used to open a cell phone account. No loss to victim at time of report.
- An accident involving village property was taken and village hall notified for repair.
- A report of suspicious males on the front lawn of a Kensington Court home was reported. Upon arrival it was found to be landscapers sitting and eating lunch. Complainant asked that they move and subjects complied voluntarily.
- A report of a suspicious occupied vehicle on Park Road was investigated and found to be a motorist pulled over using their phone.
- Police were called to HQ by a tow company with documentation for a repossession. All paperwork verified and found to be in order.
- Light outages/issues were reported throughout the month and submitted to the village hall for repair.
- A suspicious vehicle with occupants was reported on Beverly Road. Complainant further stated that they were possibly checking car doors. Police responded and after an extensive search, were unable to locate vehicle matching the description.
- A resident of Beverly Road reported downed wires in rear of the home. Police responded and determined that the wires were old and not in service any longer. PSE&G notified to remove low hanging/ out of service wires.
- A suspicious vehicle was reported on Nassau Drive. Upon arrival police located the unoccupied, legally parked vehicle. Vehicle information was recorded and marked for parking violation.
- An open door at a construction site was reported. Police responded and checked interior and exterior. All appeared in order and door was secured shut.
